She was born Lydia Lili'u Loloku Walania Wewehi Kamaka'eha; September 2, 1838 – November 11, 1917, and was the last reigning monarch of the Kingdom of Hawaii beginning January 29, 1891 until the overthrow of the Kingdom of Hawaii on January 17, 1893. The composer of "Aloha 'Oe" and numerous other musical compositions, she authored her biography during her imprisonment following the overthrow.
